





Predictions That Never Happened



In the mid-1950s, Dr. Lyle B. Borst—a physics professor at the University of Utah who had formerly been a reactor <u>designer</u> with the Atomic Energy Commission—and his students in his Physics 280 Nuclear <u>Technology</u> course had a great idea. Regular locomotives had to make frequent stops to take on coal or oil. How much better would be a locomotive that could travel around the world twice without refueling? This thinking resulted in the X-12, a nuclear-powered locomotive developed by Borst and his students—in collaboration with the Association of American Railroads and several industries, including GM, Commonwealth Edison, Trane, GE and Westinghouse. The X-12 would have weighed 360 tons and been 160 feet long—so long that the engine had to be divided into two sections, with a flexible vestibule connecting them. As we all know it never came to pass.

- "Integra-luggage" arrangement with suitcases stored in waste space areas. Extra large glove boxes (6" x 6" x 20") on each side of car.
- Full 6' width of average size car rather than small car width, giving greater comfort and storage.
- 7. Full hemispherical vision in all directions including view of curb while parking.
- 8. Centralized instrument panel featuring Hamilton celestial time zone clock permitting actual flight type navigation.
- 9. Genuine leather upholstery and trim including leather floor and matching leather luggage.
- 10. True Hi-Fi radio and record playing setup utilizing dome as perfect sound chamber

The **Astra-gnome** is concept car by industrial designer Richard Arbib using a 1955 Nash Metropolitan chassis. Described as a "Time and Space Car", it features themes influenced by the space travel forms that were popular during the 1950s. The vehicle presented Arbib's vision of what an automobile would look like in the year 2000.

American Motors commissioned Richard Arbib, a leading industrial designer of the 1950s, to develop <u>a</u> futuristic concept car. Built in four months, the Astra-Gnome represented the work product stylists to create "new and exciting shapes, textures and colors in a functional car." Arbib had the wheels and <u>tires</u> hidden behind full <u>fender skirts</u> to achieve "a floating special quality" and to suggest a spacecraft or hovercraft.

The vehicle was featured on the 3 September 1956 cover of <u>Newsweek</u> magazine and a highlight at the 1956 New York International Auto Show. About 1,000 questionnaire cards were distributed to viewers at the auto show, with results indicating an 80% favorable response to the prototype. Numerous photos were made of the car with Arbib, most often accompanied by attractive female models who explained to the media that the concept was never intended for production.

Despite a 25% increase in size over the original Metropolitan body, the total weight remains under 2,000 lb (907 kg). About 400 lb (181 kg) of aluminum castings and extrusions were used, including fluted aluminum side panels that had been anodized in different blending colors. [41] The bubble canopy provides an

unobstructed vision all around; this covered the passengers, but could be raised to allow walk-in entry and exit. The Nash Metropolitan features the body work by Andrew Mazzara of New York. Among its many features is a Hamilton "celestial time-zone clock permitting actual flight-type navigation". The acrylic glass bubble canopy also served as a sound chamber for the car's high fidelity radio and record player. The car included air conditioning and wrap-around bumper protection that was matched to the height of full-sized car bumpers. The 6-foot (1.83 m) width of the concept car was much greater than contemporary passenger automobiles and allowed for extra interior room, as well as storage and luggage spaces that included six pieces of matched integrated luggage. The concept car "disappeared into oblivion" to be recovered from New York City in 1980. The car is restored and can be seen in a California museum








TOM O'HARA'S '34 CONVERTIBLE SEDAN

Our Packard Club of San Diego (PCoSD) members journeyed up to Newport Beach to show as well as display their Packards. Mark Burnside drove Elvira a 1955 Clipper Custom Touring Sedan up Saturday morning and Tom O'Hara hauled his 1934 Convertible Sedan up to be judged. While Elvira was for display Tom's beauty was judged. Although Tom did not win an award, **his** Packard was entered into the Circle of Champions which means his car scored over 220 points out of a possible 250. Twenty five Packards signed to be judged and an additional twenty six were registered as display. As usual, there were some very nice Packards to enjoy. Three gentlemen from Chula Vista, CA ran into Carol Ross, or perhaps she ran into them, and they expressed an interest in joining our club. Used Chevrolets....Classic Coke...Classic Fried Chicken.. at the grocery store the other day, I bought some "Classic Shoe Laces" some "Classic Potato Chips" and of course, some "Classic Macaroni Salad"!

So please, my car is not for sale, nor is it fried chicken, used Chevrolet, or Macaroni salad" ...could you call it a "nice old car"? Please don't insult it by calling it a "classic" ..! This 1938 formal Sedan had an interesting discussion on the use and or overuse of the word "classic" with examples of the use of the word on product promotion. I particularly liked the classic shoelaces by Kiwi.

I am Earl Rubenstein Director of Earle C Anthony Region Los Angeles, For "The Packard Club".

Every year we have an "ALL WESTERN TOUR" (started 1985) comprised of the San Francisco Region (NORCAL), Reno Nevada Region, The Oregon Region and ECA Region. We are inviting your region to join with us this year in May 17th through 20th in Auburn, California. Thursday in the driving there part and arriving Friday and Saturday our touring days with a closing banquet dinner on Saturday evening. Sunday is driving home. Each year we rotate region responsibility for planning the tour. This year, 2018, it is ECA's turn to plan and arrange the tour. Next year it will be the Packards of Oregon region with NORCAL and Reno following. Packards of San Diego would fall in line for planning this tour in 2022.

We're still locking down details, but here are the highlights of the tour:

- Early-bird tour of a private car collection in Sacramento
- A morning driving tour through the back roads of the Gold Country ending at the Empire Mine
- Cornish miners' luncheon and an afternoon private tour of the Empire Mine, one of the oldest, largest, and richest hard rock gold mines in California. From 1850 until its closure in 1956, an estimated 5.8 million ounces of gold were extracted from the 367 miles of underground passages at the mine
- Visit to Old Sacramento, including a private tour of the California Automobile Museum in Old Sacramento, guided tours of the California State Railroad Museum, and a group lunch in Old Sacramento. Old Sacramento dates back to 1848 when the Gold Rush began. It was the last stop on the Pony Express route, the terminus of the transcontinental railroad, and it housed the original California Supreme Court Chambers
- Trip to Sutter's Fort, the centerpiece of the earliest settlement in Sacramento, pre-dating the Gold Rush
- Closing buffet banquet at Tap & Vine in Downtown Auburn

We already have 24 rooms booked (reserved by Members) for the tour. If you are interesting in attending, you'll have to get your reservation in soon as the block reserved may fill up and our special rate might be slightly higher if the block of rooms are filled.
