

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

For quite some time now, I have been following (or directly involved with) various car clubs efforts to grow membership, attract new members - in particular younger members - and increase participation. I have come to the conclusion that we continue to identify the problems but can't seem to move on to the next step. Some clubs have taken steps to deal with the issues in a positive way but most are still on the sidelines waving their arms. Our Packard club is no different in that we have all these issues in varying degrees of magnitude. Most of the car clubs I belong to have been in existence for about fifty to fifty five years. If one looks closely not much has really changed in the past fifty five years. The methods we use to publish our newsletters have changed, we now use word processors instead of IBM typewriters and no more mimeographs but, the process is still the same. We produce, print, and mail a newsletter. Our region has moved on a step in using the internet extensively as well as our website. Approximately 80% of our members receive their communication via the internet while the other 20% communicate as we did in the beginning of our club, fifty years ago. Before I get egged it is not my intention to be critical or put anyone down. Some of us like to get a "hardcopy" communication and some do not use a computer. That is just the way it is. While it is a noble task to grow our membership and attract younger members for sure however, we do not want to neglect the members we already have.

Our region has a very low dropout rate and I think that is because the members believe that they are getting value for their investment of time and money. This is the primary reason that the San Diego Region strives diligently to have interesting events for our members. It is rewarding to the organizer to put together a fun event that everyone enjoys. It can be equally discouraging when one has a party and no one shows up. The San Diego Region has to give you a reason to join us AFTER you have joined Packards International. Unfortunately we cannot have one without the other. All the car clubs I belong to, save one, has the policy that a member must belong to the national organization before being permitted to join a local chapter, region or section etc. There are several reasons for this which we will not delve into here except to say that they are all good reasons in my opinion. The most significant one is liability insurance. From my personal involvement and experience in car clubs this is a huge issue that most members are not aware of and they should not be. The purpose of the club is to provide a safe fun, emphasize fun, worry free environment for us to enjoy our Packards. The only thing we should have to worry about is if our magnificent ride will get us home on her own power.



PACKARDS IN A BOAT PARADE??

that Packards would be in a boat parade. In case you are wondering the Packards did not float on the water nor did they try. In fact we were at least 10 miles from the ocean or water. The neighborhood where Phil and Heather Pizzuto reside (Jeffries Ranch Community) has a Christmas parade every year that consists of a boat on a trailer pulled by (usually) a big pickup with the entire rig fully decorated with Christmas lights The parade, sponsored by the people who live in this community of northeast Oceanside, is quite an event to witness as crowds spectators stand outside their homes and celebrate with parties and bonfires and wait to watch the Parade of lights that drive throughout their neighborhood. The boats are joined by a variety of other entries such as golf carts, bicycles people strolling and, of course, the Packards.

We assembled at the Pizzuto residence on Saturday December 1 in the late afternoon to prepare for the big show. Participants in the event were Phil Pizzuto in the Blue Bomb. Steve Ross in the Yellow Peril and Mark Burnside and Sydney Kirkland in Miss Daisy. Sarah Pizzuto, daughter of Phil and Heather, and her friends were on hand to assist in preparing the Packards for the parade. Battery powered lights were strung from one end of the Packards to the other. Wreaths were hung on the grill along with flashing stars and I think there was a set of antlers. Karl and Peggy Ramsing were there sans Packard to provide moral support and some advice. Heather made sure there were lots of hot beverages, including hot apple cider and an assortment of delicious warm appetizers for us to munch on. The installation of lights lighting was completed just in time as word was soon passed that it was time to proceed to the staging point. Darkness fell and the parade was under way.

The parade is guite a spectacle to see with cars, trucks, boats on trailers and golf carts all covered in Christmas lights driving down the street. The three Packards covered with colorful lights made quite an impression on everyone. This year there was even a motorcycle decorated to look like a sailboat that helped stop cross traffic to allow the parade to move freely through the streets. We snaked our way through the streets for at least 6 miles with the sidewalks lined with moms, dads, grandparents and lots of kids, all ages. There were driveway parties in progress with grills (the cooking kind) going and great smells of good stuff cooking. At least one of the floats had a grill with folks jumping on and off all during the parade. The reception the Packards received was phenomenal. As we drove slowly we could hear the comments from everyone who loved seeing the three Packards. We heard anything from "look, that's a Rolls Royce" to "there goes a Ford" but it is was clear that our three Packards were a big hit and they were the only classic cars in the parade. The most common response was "Oh look at those beautiful old cars". Some spectators knew they were seeing a Packard but most did not. Other common names given us were Duesenberg and Bentley. Not once did we hear Cadillac or Lincoln. (Whew!)

We had a lot of fun driving and honking ours horns and shouting "Merry Christmas." Spectators waved and cheered as we passed. For some this is their Christmas party; we saw several homes with tables and chairs and food set up in their front yards with crowds of people partying. At one such home, a friend of Phil's ran up to the car and gave him a big swig from his glass of wine to keep him refreshed as he continued to drive. It takes almost two hours to drive the entire parade route.



1929 Packard Club Sedan. Worlds first car radio installation

The Packard automobile has the distinction of being the first in many automotive innovations. On one occasion being first was not a benefit to Packard history. The story goes that Bill Lear and Elmer Wavering on a date in 1929 with their girl friends drove to a lookout point on the Mississippi in the town of Quincy, Illinois to watch the sunset. One of the ladies commented that it would be nice to listen to music in the car. The boys thought this was a super idea and proceeded to invent the car radio. Lear had been trained as a Navy radio operator during WW1 and Wavering had a radio shop so they did have knowledge of how a radio worked. They soon discovered that an automobile generates all sorts of "noise" from the car's electrical system. Some of these sources are

spark plugs, ignition switches, and generator to name a few that made it impossible to listen to the radio if the engine was running... They finally eliminated the noise and had a radio that worked. They took their radio to a radio convention in Chicago where they met a man named Paul Gavin who owned a company that manufactured a device called a battery eliminator which allowed a radio to operate on AC power. As more homes were wired for electricity radio manufacturers began making radios that ran on AC thus eliminating the need for Gavin's "Battery Eliminator". Gavin viewed this car radio idea as a new source of business and brought Lear and Wavering into his company to develop the car radio. When the first radio was perfected it was tested in Gavin's Studebaker. Gavin went to his bank and presented the idea to his banker for financing and to sweeten the pot he installed the world's first car radio in the bankers Packard. It took about three days to prepare and install the radio. About a half hour after installation the Packard caught on fire!! In case you are wondering they did not get the loan! Undaunted they went back to the Studebaker and installed it, with lessons learned we assume.

This reproduction of Motorola's first car radio, 1930's model 5T71, included (left to right) a radio receiver, tuning control and speaker.



Note the caption saying it is easy to install. Maybe with the body removed it is easy. They named the radio Motorola because most radios then ended with "ola", so they decided on Motorola as the radio was in a motor car. When the Motorola went on sale it cost \$110.00 uninstalled. A new car cost \$650.00. Assuming a mechanic then was paid \$.60 an hour in1930, it would cost \$15.00 to install. In todays dollars that comes to a little over \$3,000. Bill Lear went on to be the Lear of Lear Jet fame and had other numerous inventions

including the eight track tape.

Paul Gavin and Elmer wavering traveled around the USA in this Van pictured below pitching their car radio



Advertising, as on this car radio demonstration vehicle in 1932, helped to make Motorola a familiar brand name. Elmer Wavering developed the alternator for the automobile in the 1950's

Although being first is not always a positive it did benefit mankind in the end. The radio installation in my 1939 Packard is essentially the same as the first car radio made in 1930. The tuner is a bit more modern but the rest is essentially the same.


The rest of the story on the Fernandez & Darrin Packard

I ran across an article in the recent issue of Old Cars Weekly relating a lot of history of this Packard. This 1933 Packard 12 is a one-off, three position Cabriolet DeVille body constructed by Fernandez-Darrin of Paris for Charles Lindberg's father inlaw Dwight W. Morrow. Mr. Morrow was a partner of J.P. Morgan and one of the richest men in New Jersey. He was ambassador to Mexico and was a U.S. Senator at the time of his death. I took the photos of this Packard at the Williamsburg, Virginia PAC meet last September. At the time I had no idea of the cars history.





The current owner is Dr. Robert D Briglia. Dr Briglia first saw the car at the age of fourteen and purchased the Packard in 1965. Dr Briglia has a 1935 Associated Press photo where this Packard appears to be one of the cars parked on Main Street in Farmington, New Jersey while Bruno Hauptmann was on trial for the kidnapping of the Lindberg baby.





