Some automobile trivia.

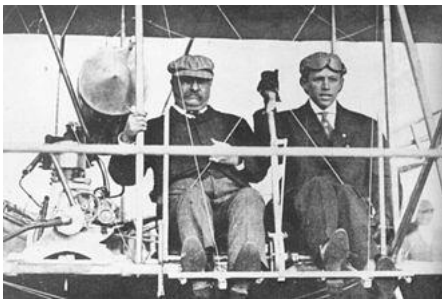


The first official White House car was a 1909 White Steamer, ordered by President Taft. Taft converted the White House horse stalls to garages for the automobile.



The first president to use an automobile in an official function was President Theodore Roosevelt and the first to do so publicly, with full guarded accompaniment. On August 22, 1902, while on a campaign tour, he rode in a Columbia Electric Victoria Phaeton. The car had a maximum speed of 13 miles. Also notable is that in 1910, Theodore Roosevelt became the first United States president to fly in an airplane, albeit not while in office. Franklin D. Roosevelt became the first to fly in a plane while serving as president, on his trip to the Casablanca Conference in January 1943.

The Board of Directors of the Packards International San Diego Region has agreed that our club's treasury will sponsor this event of the day. Expect to spend a leisurely late afternoon swapping stories and talking Packard stuff. Then we'll leave by 4:30 to go form up for the parade.

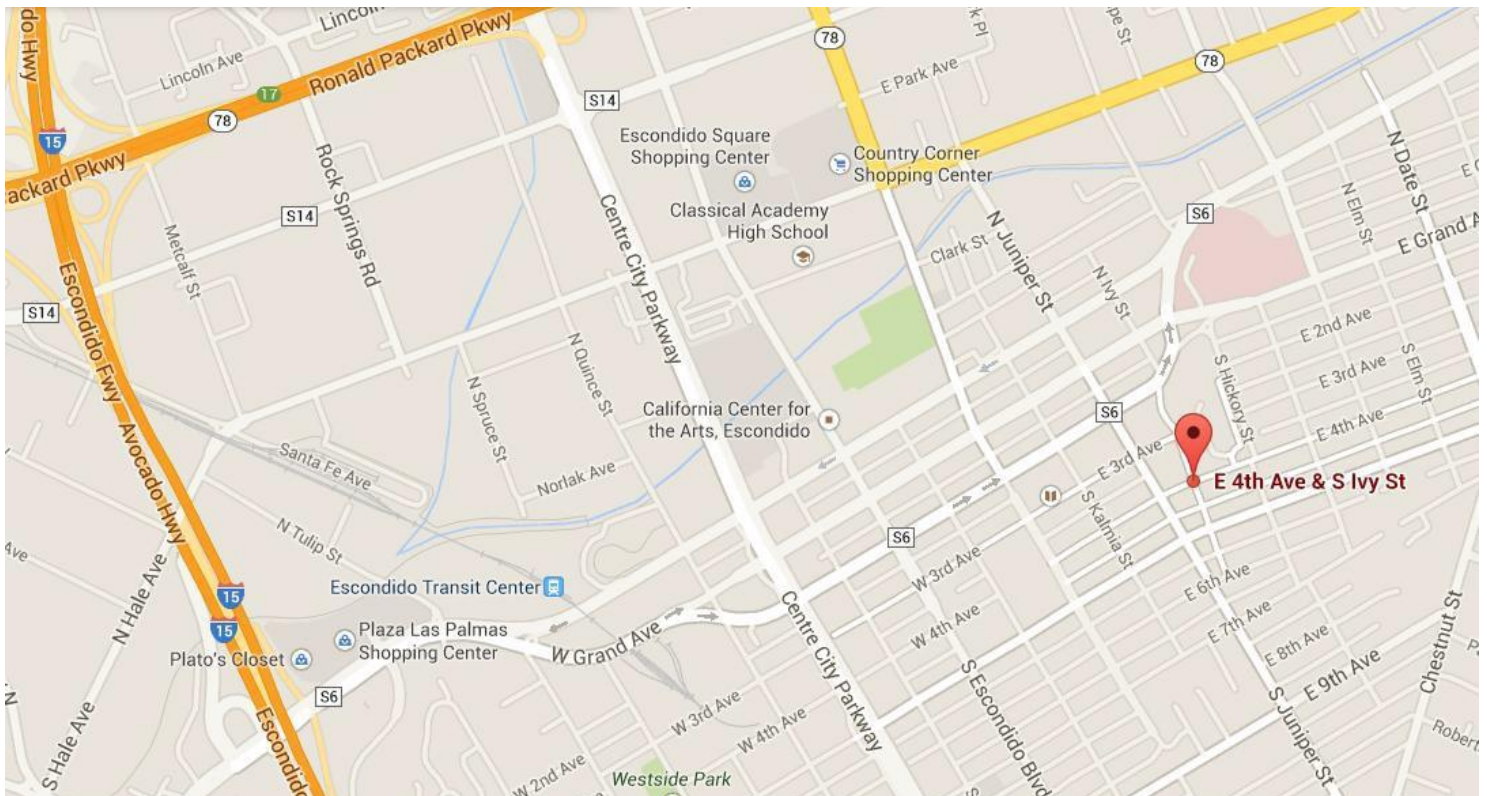
By 4:45 pm - Have your classic at the corner of East 4th Avenue & South Ivy Street, Escondido to form up for the **Parade of Packards & Pierce-Arrows** down Grand Avenue

5:00 pm - The **Parade of Packards and Pierce-Arrows** begins. Parade cars will be single file in year order. Oldest car leads the parade. Of the 26 Cruisin' Grands held every year, this is the only parade of cars prior to the start of the event. In past years we have had a motorcycle police escort courtesy of the [Escondido Police Department](#). We have requested the escort again this year and hope to have confirmation soon.

5:15 pm to 9:00 pm - Your classic buggy is on display on South Broadway for the public to see, appreciate, and admire. Once again, the *PI San Diego Region Board of Directors* is planning all the niceties that add to the evening: People's Choice Award voting by the public, windshield placards for all pre-registered cars, parking in year order, a staffed information booth, and more. The presentation of the People's Choice Award will be made by Steve Waldron, Cruisin' Grand Founder and Organizer, at the 8:00 Awards Ceremony. Expect LOTS of questions from the admiring public. (Like: Who made Packards? Is this a hearse? Are you the original owner? When did Mercedes stop making Packards? How do you shift it? etc)

Other fun facts and items of note about this year's event:

- 1) All Packards and Pierce Arrows are invited to any and all of the day's activities. There is no charge or registration fee. Membership in PI (or any region of PI) is NOT required. Please forward this to ANYONE you know who owns a Packard or Pierce Arrow. Also note that only Packards and Pierce-Arrows can be accommodated at KUSI, in the parade, and at Cruisin' Grand. We do, however, require every Packard and Pierce-Arrow owner to register ahead of time by completing and returning the registration form on the next page. - 2) We will be parked in a special roped-off area of South Broadway. We need to have at least 25 Packards and Pierce-Arrows at the event to maintain this area exclusive to our makes. Fewer than 25 cars means that Cruisin' Grand event organizers can allow non-Packards and non-Pierce-Arrow to park in our space. We fervently want to avoid the shame and indignity associated with such an undesirable outcome.
- 3) You will be on your own for dinner. There are many nice restaurants along Grand Avenue - from \$ to \$\$\$\$.
- 4) **Cruisin' Grand™** is a weekly cruise-in sponsored by the City of Escondido - held every Friday night from the first Friday in April to the last Friday in September. On each Friday a classic vehicle organization is invited to display their vehicles in a special roped-off area for the evening. This event is special: It's an incredible outreach opportunity for us to present our classic motorcars to a (very) interested public. Out of the 26 Cruisin' Grand events held each year, *Packard/Pierce-Arrow Night* ranks a solid #3 in public interest (behind *Nitro Night* and *Fire Truck Night*). Attendance for Packard Night in previous years has been estimated at 5,000+. With this kind of interest and enthusiasm from the public, it only makes sense for us to mobilize every roadworthy Packard and Pierce-Arrow for the event. We sincerely hope that you will join us.

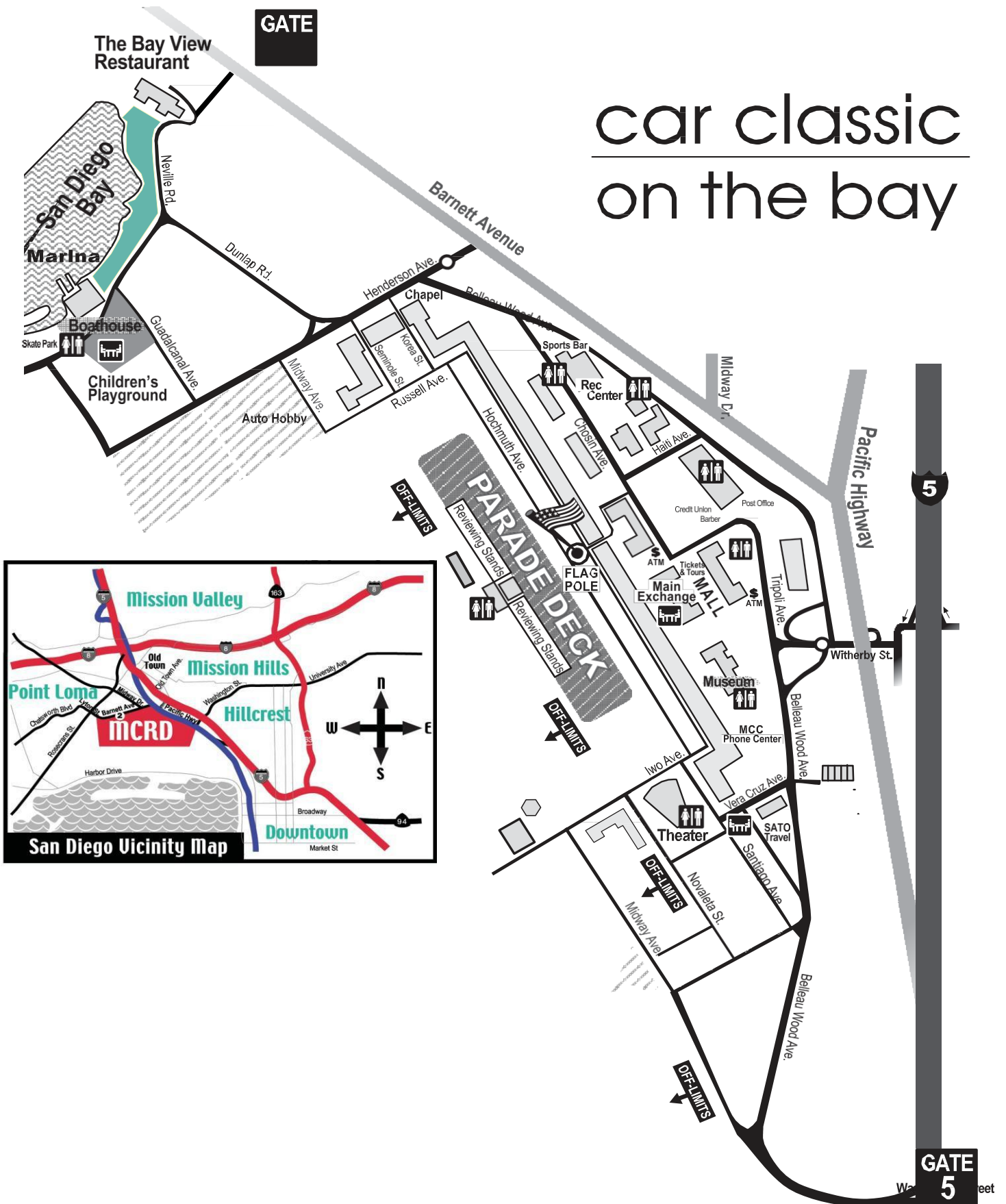

MY FIRST CAR

This is not about a Packard but not many young men in rural Missouri, in the middle of the last century, had the funds to purchase a Packard and in fact most of the boys had only heard of a Packard. Most of us can remember vividly our first automobile that was our very own. In my case it was a 1951 Oldsmobile 98 Sedan, a boat. That may seem like an unusual choice for a young guy. At that time the 55 Chevy V-8 and the Fords were the car of choice. I purchased my Olds in the fall of 1957 from a used car lot in Kansas City, Missouri and I paid \$350 for the car "out the door". There were several of the more popular cars on the lot but they cost a bit more and I really liked that big Olds. As I recall, it had a little over 60,000 miles on it. It had the Hydramatic drive and was loaded for that era including fender skirts. I drove the wheels off the car for eighteen months

without one problem and it was quite roomy! Although it did not look the part, I soon learned that it was faster in every respect than the Fords and Mercurys of that era including the 1954 Ford. It cruised easily at 70 mph which was a bit fast for most of the roads then but it handled well and the brakes were more than adequate. What I have found both unusual and interesting is that I have never seen an Olds 98 at any car show or auction that I have attended. I have seen plenty of 88's but no 98's. One would assume that the 98 is not all that collectible nor as sleek and "hot" looking as the 88. The Oldsmobile pictured here is identical to the one I had: same color and all except the Olds here does not have fender skirts.



The guys I grew up with in rural Missouri were all Ford men as were their fathers and as matter of fact they still are. They could make the word Chevy sound dirty if not even filthy. Oldsmobile and Cadillac were considered over priced Chevies. I was working for Standard Oil Company in Kansas City and went home at least one weekend a month and usually got a lot of crap about the Olds. I knew the day was coming and finally it did; I was challenged to a drag race against the Ford boys. You all know there is no way out of this without losing your dignity, all semblances of manhood and "face". There was a stretch of flat paved rural highway along a river bottom about 6 miles long that was the place to settle any and all car matters. The 6 or 7 mile drive to the site was a long one for me as I knew I and my land yacht were going to get our butt waxed by these Fords and Mercurys. I just wanted to get it over with, take all their s--t and be on my way. We arrived at the scene for the slaughter and it was decided that I would run against a '53 Mercury so we lined up door handle to door handle. I looked down the loooong stretch of highway and figured it would be all over with long before I reached the turnaround point. I also knew that I would have to endure a run against all of them after they tasted blood. A guy named Jerry Clark wanted to ride with me, probably to witness the look of defeat on my face. Jerry's brother in the "Merc" did not want a passenger due to the added weight

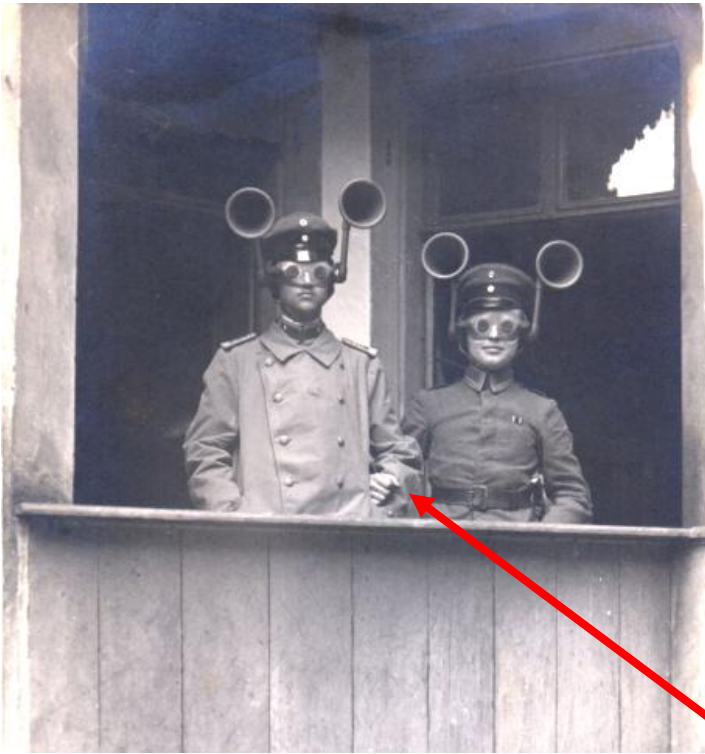


and I knew then that they did not want defeat but humiliation. The Mercury is revving with dual glass packs roaring. I saw no point in revving the Olds as it had a stock muffler, only one that you could barely hear. Tom drops the flag and away we go. The Mercury is making a deafening roar with tires squealing while the Olds squats like a mule pulling a sledge loaded with bricks and proceeds to pull away! Holy s--t Batman I am beating this guy! By the time we get to the end of the run the Mercury was far behind in my rear view mirror. Jerry my passenger is sitting there with a look of utter disbelief. I stifled my desire to scream out a shout of you know what and maintained a look of humility. When we returned to the starting point there was a conference of the Ford boys and I of course said it was probably just a fluke, while knowing full well it was not. They were mine. After conferencing it was decided that I would run against the '49 and '51 Mercury

respectfully. These two were considered faster as they had a lot of chrome and louder pipes. Results were the same but worse for them, like duh. By this time there is a lot of "carb" adjustment going on, tire pressure checks, taking everything out of the trunk etc. Looking back all they could adjust was the idle. I did nothing but sit in the car and drive. I had a passenger on every run. Finally the starter Tom who had a '54 Ford that was really tricked out stated that "this was enough of this crap" and he was going to put me and the land yacht away. We ran with the same results as the other constants except Tom had to do it twice. By now I am not acting humble anymore but had the "bring it on attitude". I have never forgotten that day and it is without a doubt the high point of my driving career - and it happened so early in my life. I still see these men every year and that day has never been mentioned. I believe I will bring it up next time I see them, this year as a matter of fact. There have never been any comments about the car I am driving when I go back to the homeland. I secretly wish they would as I would very much like to re-live that day that happened fifty eight years ago.
