




The Convertible Sedan on Model 840 for 1931, Style No. 1881, was little changed except in price, which was reduced to \$5,275.



**WELCOME TO THE MISSION INN,** Riverside's premier historical and architectural landmark. The current building occupies an entire city block in the heart of downtown Riverside, but this was not always so. The Mission Inn's origin's were as a two-story, 12-room adobe boarding house. Built in 1876 by Christopher Columbus Miller on land deeded to him by the city fathers as payment for his services as a civil engineer. The adobe also served as the Miller family home. While C.C. Miller busied himself surveying land tracts and laying out irrigation canals, the Miller women-wife, Mary, and daughters Emma and Alice-ran the hotel. Miller's eldest son Frank, later known as the "Master of the Inn," was slow to dedicate himself to the hotel business, trying instead to make his mark through the various entrepreneurial ventures including real estate, citrus farming, and retail. Then in 1880, at age 22 and anticipating his upcoming marriage, Frank opted to purchase the adobe and surrounding property from his father for \$5,000.

By the turn of the century , Riverside was already a major tourist attraction for wealthy easterners and Europeans (principally British) escaping to warm winter climates and seeking investment opportunities in the burgeoning and profitable citrus industry. What the city lacked, though, was a major tourist

hotel. Throughout the 1890's, Frank Miller came up with several failed schemes to secure the financing for his grander version of a hotel. Finally, in 1902, with an architectural design by Mission Revival proponent Arthur B. Benton and the financial backing of Henry E. Huntington, Miller built a four-story U-shaped hotel enclosing a large central courtyard.

Over the next thirty years Miller added three more wings to the structure. The Cloister Wing , Built in 1910, added more guest rooms, but here was an increased emphasis on public spaces, including a large music room, an art and gift shop, and the St.Cecilia Chapel. The famous Cloister Walk also called the Catacombs, with its niches, chambers, and art objects (including Henry Chapman Ford's Master set of paintings of the California Missions) became a major attraction. It is now closed to the public. Still utilizing the Mission Revival Style, the eastern facade of the wing was borrowed from Mission San Gabriel, the northern facade from Carmel Mission.

Next came the Spanish Wing in 1913-14, designed by Myron Hunt. Working from Miller's ideas, as did all of the Inn's architects, Hunt's design leaned more toward increasing public spaces than adding guest rooms. Here the Spanish Patio, reminiscent of a Spanish castle courtyard, offered guests an outdoor dining experience. Frank Miller's growing collection of art and artifacts prompted the inclusion on the large Spanish Art Gallery to exhibit parts of the collection. Two floors of additional guest rooms, including the Authors Row suites and Miller's own

private suite, were added in the 1920's.

Finally, the International Rotunda Wing, completed in 1931 near the end of Miller's life, filled out the original city block. Given over almost entirely to public, office, and retail spaces, the wing added only ten guest Designed by local architect G. Stanley Wilson, the Rotunda featured an open air, five-story, spiral staircase, another art gallery (The Galleria), the Famous Fliers Wall (a monument to pioneers in aviation), the St. Francis Chapel, and the Court of the Orient. Miller added the chapel specifically to accommodate a massive Eighteenth Century gold-leafed cedar altar from Mexico and seven of a set of eight equally impressive Louis C. Tiffany stained glass windows (the eighth was installed in the Galleria). The Court of the Orient reflected Miller's long time interest in far eastern cultures, especially Japan. Indeed, his support of the Japanese-American community and his efforts to bridge the gaps between Japan and the United States in the years before World War II


were honored by Emperor Hirohito by inducting Miller into the Order of the

Rising Star in 1929.

Miller cultivated a wide circle of friends from among his guests. President Theodore Roosevelt stayed at the Inn soon after the 1903 Mission Wing was built and took part in the ceremonial replanting of one of Riverside's two parent navel orange trees in the courtyard of the hotel. Andrew Carnegie and David Starr Jordan encouraged Miller's participation in the international peace movement that inspired annual conferences at the Inn. Elbert Hubbard, founder of make-believe... of the Roycraft Studios and author of "Message to Garcia," took part in the

A walk through its winding hallways and courtyards is a game Lusitania. Maud Adams, Sarah Bernardt, and Madame Modjeska, who all played to Riverside audiences in the Loring Opera House (managed by Miller), retired after performances to rooms at the Inn. Hamlin Garland, author of Son of the Middle Border, wrote portions of some of his later works in the Inn's Alhambra Suite. Charles Fletcher Lummin, publisher of "Land of Sunshine" and founder of the Southwest Museum and the Landmarks Club (of which Miller was an early member), was a frequent visitor. Zona Gale, Pulitzer Prize winning novelist, was also Miller's Biographer. Visiting members of the royal houses of Sweden, Russia, Japan and others were often paid tribute at banquets in their honor.


After Frank Miller died in 1935 the Mission Inn began a slow decline. For nearly twenty years his daughter and son-in-law, Allis and DeWitt Hutchings, carried on the traditions of hospitality engendered by Miller, but the Great Depression, the increased mobility afforded by the automobile, and the shift in tourism to the desert oases centered about Palm Springs made profits more elusive. When Allis and DeWitt died in 1952 and 1953 respectively, their heirs showed little interest in maintaining the family business and



sold the Inn in 1956. For the next twenty years a litary of owners occupied the hotel. All had their own ideas of what a modern Mission Inn should be and how to make it so. Sadly, improvements often came at the expense of the art and object collections, many pieces of which suffered from neglect or were disposed of entirely.

Finally, in 1976 the Riverside Redevelopment Agency purchased the Inn. Day to day management of the hotel was consigned to the Mission Inn Foundation, instituted specifically for that purpose. In 1985 the Inn closed for what was expected to be a two year renovation project. With the renovation nearing completion in late 1988, owner/developer Carley Capital of Madison, Wisconsin announced a "December Surprise." Two weeks before the scheduled reopening the Carley Group filed for bankruptcy. Over the next four years several attempts were made to sell the Inn to an appropriate buyer. Then late in 1992, a long time Riverside resident, Duane R. Roberts formed a new corporation, the Historic Mission Inn Corporation, and they successfully negotiated the purchase. On December 30, 1992, exactly seven and a half years after it was closed, the Mission Inn was once again opened to the public. A grand opening was scheduled for the Spring of 1993.

Following the sale of the Inn to Carley Capital in 1985 the focus of the Mission Inn Foundation, a non-profit organization, shifted to the preservation of the hotel's historical and architectural integrity and the conservation, collection, exhibition, and interpretation of its art and artifacts. The foundation conducts an extensive outreach program through slide presentation, a lecture series, education programs, and oral history project, research opportunities, internships, and daily tours.



To its guests and to the people of Riverside the Mission Inn has always meant more than simply bed, bath, and board. It is an oddly integrated assemblage of arcades and gardens, turrets and domes, flying buttresses and spiraling staircases, catacombs and carillon towers. It is also fine art and spanish cannons, stained glass and ceramic tile, saints and dragons, bells and wrought iron. More than anything, though, it is an artful and architectural tribute to the vision, eclecticism, and eccentricity of Frank Miller; one that deserves to be experienced and appreciated by all who happen upon it.
