

WHAT HAPPENED? A PERSONAL OBSERVATION

It is understandable why automobile makers such as Peerless, Pierce-Arrow, and Duesenberg went out of business during the great depression. It was not because they weren't good cars, they were just too expensive, and refused to react to the market. But what happened after WWII? After the war, most, if not all, automobile manufacturers were in excellent financial condition. The public was eager to buy anything. My father paid more for a used 1947 Chevy than a new one would have cost. He had just returned from the South Pacific, with money, and he was not content to drive the 37 Ford nor was he willing to wait a month or so for a new car.

Nash, Hudson, Studebaker, Kaiser, Fraizer, and Packard are automobile manufacturers that are no longer with us. Did these companies go out of business because of low quality, unreliable, or perhaps public opinion? All of the cars were of excellent quality and had been around for many years. The Nash built a quality automobile; the six-cylinder engine was superior to the Chevy six in many respects. The Hudson, perhaps the best built of the lot, had a strong engine, handled well, and dominated the stock car circuit for several years. Studebaker was a dependable automobile. The Kaiser and Frazier were newcomers to the automotive world and were a good value for the money. Then we have Packard, and enough said about that. Most of these automobiles were in the same market as the Ford, Chevy, Buick, and perhaps Mercury.

In my opinion, these cars were "killed off" by styling and excellent competitors marketing, or as I like to call it, propaganda. Social perception played a role as well; what the Joneses drove played a significant role. General Motors, Ford, and to a lesser extent, Chrysler were the "in" crowd.

I recall the comments about non-big three cars, such as Nash, viewed as looking like a bathtub and not reliable and challenging to maintain. The public perceived Hudson as expensive, just too exotic and different, a nice car but not for the average man. The Studebaker was OK but underpowered and unremarkable body design. The most damning comment was, they were all oil burners, not as in diesel, but used a lot of oil, and they were all accused of using a lot of gas. When the Studebaker came out in 1953 with the new body style, the comments were, "Oh my God, have you seen the new Studebaker! Men could just not get their head around this American car looking like something from Europe. The Kaiser and Frazier were considered exciting, but most said, "I would not buy one." In rural America, where I grew up, men who drove one of these cars were referred to as John Smith, the guy who owns that Nash, Hudson, etc. Most still had flathead six-cylinder engines, which were considered obsolete, and the V-8 or overhead valve engine was the only way to go. A man in our community bought a Frazier. I am not exaggerating when I say that people spoke of Jake Clark and his Frazier as if he had a terminal disease. Everyone drove a Ford or Chevy, and if you didn't, well, you were not with the "in" crowd. A man in my community bought a 1953 Studebaker, which was the town's talk for several months. The conversation usually begins with: what was he thinking?! I must admit that I was influenced by styling; I did not like Nash or the Packard bathtub look.

It appears that marketing, media, and public opinion may have as much to do with a product's failure as does quality.
