The Grand Dame of Grand Boulevard

With that spare \$7 million you have in your pocket, you can purchase a couple very rare Packards crossing the block at Pebble Beach, or be the only person on your block to own a block of Packard related history.



This July, two buildings and surrounding property that were once part of the sprawling Packard plant complex, were listed for sale at \$6.95 million. For that you get 180,000 square-feet of office and warehouse space at 1600 and 1634 East Grand Boulevard in Detroit. There are ten acres in all and one of the buildings is the old Building No. 82 where Packard built marine engines and is on the same block and adjacent to the former Packard Plant Administration Building.

The buildings are not part of Fernando Palazuelo's Packard Plant holdings. Palazuelo, a Peru based developer, bought the 40 acre

factory complex in 2013 for \$405,000 at a Wayne County tax foreclosure auction. The deed requires that taxes be kept current on the 3.5 million square-foot complex and progress be made in demolition or redevelopment of the site that consists of 43 parcels. The dilapidated plant has not been used for car production since 1956. Over the years it has fallen into disrepair and has become the target of repeated fires, thieves, metal scrappers and graffiti artists. You have seen the pictures and they are very sad to view. On January 23rd of this year, the oft photographed bridge over Grand Boulevard collapsed. The next month, a section of the plant owned by Detroit was demolished

With that being said, the general consensus is that the reinforced concrete used to construct the plant is still structurally sound and that some of the buildings could be renovated and reused. The framework is strong enough that you could use the infrastructure and rebuild. The factory reflected the focus on engineering that Packard was known for. Packard brought in famed architect Albert Kahn (who later designed the Packard Proving Grounds) to develop a new form of steel reinforced concrete. At its height, the Packard Plant occupied more than 4 million square feet and employed more than 40,000 people. The Plant opened in 1903 and was considered the most modern automobile manufacturing facility in the world - ground breaking, efficient and massive in scale.



The plant was in operation until June 25, 1956. The die was cast with the purchase of Studebaker by Packard in 1954 and production was moved to Studebaker in South Bend.

In 2017, Palazuelo announced an ambitious four-phase redevelopment plan for the facility. The first phase would transform the old Packard Administration Building at 1580 East Grand into 120,000 square feet of commercial office space as well as an art gallery and an events venue that would be large enough for weddings. He planned on having six different uses for the Plant: residential, retail, office space, light industry and art. He hoped to bring a big-three automotive parts manufacturer to the plant in exchange for initial years of free rent. His plans also included space for local artists and an upscale go-kart track.



With a price tag was estimated to be 500 million dollars, the plan is viewed with skepticism. The Plant is more than four miles from Detroit's revitalized downtown area and is surrounded by neighborhoods where half of the homes have been torn down. There is no bus line or other transportation that goes to by the Plant. And to add to the challenges, the facility has asbestos and polluted soil from decades of industrial use.


In May of 2017, Art Express, Palazuelo's holding company, held a ground breaking ceremony for phase

one of the project which will include the former 121,000 square-foot administration building. In August of 2017, the inaugural public tour of the property was conducted which included touring the second floor of the administration building. Since then, the main concentration has been on clean-up efforts and removing debris.



Palazuelo has urged patience and said the project could take up to 15 years. Urban planners think it would be very positive if some parts of the plant could be restored. The plant represents over half a century of automotive production and progress and played a central part in World War II efforts including producing the Packard V-1650 Merlin engine which powered the P-51 Mustang fighter plane. But these same urban experts also say it would be one of the world's most ambitious and difficult redevelopment projects. But I guess if you are going to dream, dream big, right?

Breaking news: After this story was written, it was announced that Palazuelo has listed the 3.5 million square-foot property with a commercial real estate firm and is seeking buyers or tenants. The new thinking is to demolish large parts of the empty plant once tenants are found and build a modern 21st century industrial building. He has dropped his plan to redevelop parts of the plant into an eclectic mix of cultural and commercial uses. The two 20 acres sites are now available for build-to-suit where a developer agrees to build space for a tenant to lease. The commercial real estate firm says that Palazuelo plans to maintain the Administration Building and recognizes the historical significance of the site and that you will still see some of the old Packard facility on site.


